
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

It is both a thrill and a challenge to have *The Importance of Being Earnest* as my inaugural directing project here at the wonderful Hershey Area Playhouse. A thrill because this classic drawing room comedy, with its abundance of wit and paradoxical wisdom, is great fun and working on it has been a joyous adventure filled with discovery and excitement. A challenge because it has been performed so frequently, in both the best and the worst of productions, that most audience members are very familiar with it and therefore looking for something unique and satisfying in the Playhouse's production of this delightful comedy of manners.

Many productions have added a bit of unexpected flavor by casting the role of Lady Bracknell with a male actor. Most notably the famous movie and theatre actor, Geoffrey Rush; TV star Larry Linville; opera singer, Justin Birdsong; and Stratford Canada favorites William Hutt, George Maguire and Brian Bedford. In fact this summer I attended a gender-bending production at the Scena Theatre in DC where all female roles were performed by men and all male roles were performed by women. It brought a completely different twist to many of the endlessly quotable lines.

The Best Christmas Pageant Ever

Kids are the stars in holiday standard.

A sure sign that the holidays are upon us occurs when Starbucks brings out its seasonal hot drinks such as gingerbread and peppermint lattes while local theater companies roll out such standard classics as "A Christmas Carol." Fortunately for us, Hershey Area Playhouse has brought back its own sweet and frothy concoction of "The Best Christmas Pageant Ever."

This show features tons of kids in various roles, Christmas carols and a generally fun, fast-paced atmosphere in what has become a holiday tradition in our area. Under the direction of Tony Pingitore, this production is delightfully uplifting and is certain to chase away any Scrooges who might be lingering about.

The plot is simple. Each year, the local church puts on a Christmas pageant featuring well-scrubbed and mostly well-behaved local children. This year, however, a monkey wrench gets thrown at them when six delinquent children, the Herdman kids, show up at auditions and manage, simply through their mere presence, to get cast in the lead pageant roles.

The Herdmans are famous around their community – they steal the lunches from other children, they lie, curse, hit other kids, set fire to things and, oh yes, smoke

cigars. In other words, the Herdmans are the meanest, nastiest group of six unruly siblings in town. They'll ruin the Christmas pageant for sure...or will they?

"The Best Christmas Pageant Ever" is timeless in the manner in which it touches on the human condition. The recent headlines about cyber-bullying in America makes the Herdmans' actions seem all the more real to a modern audience.

However, the secret virtue of the show, for parents who might be concerned about the fact that its protagonists are a roving band of juvenile delinquents, is that the Herdmans end up being the most intellectually and spiritually connected to the "true meaning" of the pageant. Melissa Lewis, as Grace Bradley, is delightful to watch. She gives us a perfect blend of charm, witticism and appropriate frustration when the enormity of the task at hand sinks in.

One of the most impressive performances of the night goes to the littlest Herdman of all, Gladys (Lexie Corcoran). In her tattered clothing, Gladys was cast as the Angel of the Lord. Instead of muttering her simple one-liner "Unto you a child is born," she "shazams" her way onto the stage and into our hearts.

Madison Youch as Beth Bradley and Amber Emerson as Imogene Herdman stand out in their strong supporting roles. Youch, as the eldest child of the Bradley family, doubles as the show's narrator – keeping us abreast in a pleasant tone as the plot unfolds. Emerson tugs at our heartstrings with her character transformation by show's end.

But perhaps the most heartwarming – the star atop the tree, if you will – was when the entire cast appeared onstage for the final few numbers. Children will love this show – it's short enough and active enough – to hold the attention of even the youngest theatergoers.

And it really does feel like Christmas.

What's so special about Paddy's Pot?

As many of you may know, Hershey Area Playhouse is emerging as one of our area's most well respected community theatres with its carefully planned season of five main stage plays designed to be sure to meet everyone's taste. What some of you may not know is that the Playhouse is also committed to new and emerging works and to works that meet a community need. Their special event series has hosted such plays as Songs for a New World, Secrets of a Soccer Mom, The Vagina Monologues and Moon Over Montmartre to name but a few.

The special events at Hershey Area Playhouse have come to be known as a source for refreshingly original works, sensitive probing pieces and dynamic vibrant contemporary works. Which is precisely why I am so thrilled to be directing an offering for the Playhouse's special series in March with the area debut of the comedy Paddy's Pot by Thomas W. Stephens, performing March 17th, 18th, 19th at 8:00 PM, with a final matinee performance on Sunday March 20th at 2:00 PM.

So what's so special about *Paddy's Pot?* Certainly the play itself is special. It's a charmer written by a Lynchburg, VA area playwright. The play is a sweet comedy about three generations of strong Irish women living together who are asked to watch the family's newest addition- an infant who will be the first child not to be raised as a Roman Catholic. As the oldest "grand" plots to secretly baptize the infant, the audience is drawn into

the story and asked to consider what truly makes a family bind together. What is it that makes a family special to one another?

The cast members are pretty special as well. All three are veteran actresses with well respected careers in theatre in the Central Pennsylvania area and beyond.

Terri Mastrobuono plays the oldest of the "grands"- M'DEAR, aged 106. Terri is an Equity actress, director, writer, and arts educator. She cofounded Lancaster's CoMotion Theater, dedicated to generating original actor-created pieces. Terri has been featured at the Philadelphia Fringe Festival, Washington Storyteller's Theatre, Touchstone Theatre, Open Stage of Harrisburg, and Gamut Theatre. She is a roster artist with the PA Council on the Arts, and is an adjunct professor of theatre at Elizabethtown College.

Peg (85) and Ida (63) will be played by Lisa Lutton Weitzman and Linde Stern. Lisa Lutton Weitzman is a local actress and teacher at the Capital Area School for the Arts where she is the theater director. Lisa has acted in many venues in south-central PA including the PA Renaissance Faire and Theater Harrisburg. One of her favorite roles was Emily Dickinson in the one-woman show *The Belle of Amherst* at Open Stage of Harrisburg.

Linde Stern is another well know actress from the Central Pennsylvania area whose work has been admired by many. Linde is frequently seen performing at the Gamut Theatre., Fulton Opera House and Theatre of the Seventh Sister in Lancaster.

Finally this production itself is special in that it breaks new ground in sharing the stories of older adults. The grands in the story range from 63 (she's the baby) to 106 – and all are vitally strong women with interesting stories to tell.

This delicate piece explores the connections between generations and the subtle (and not so subtle) things that make us human. As we learn about these three women of a certain age, we are sure to come away learning about ourselves.

Ronald McDonald House

This past fall, the Ronald McDonald House completed construction on its expansion to provide housing for families who come to the Hershey Medical Center's Children's Hospital. It now has the capacity to house over 30 families, doubling their previous occupancy. This extension was made possible by several families and organizations donating to the cause, including Hershey Area Playhouse. In the Fall of 2008, the Playhouse presented an encore performance of Jennifer Feldser's original play, The Other Woman. Half of the proceeds from this play went to the "Building Hope and Healing Hearts" campaign as well as the daily operations of the House. As part of the campaign, contributors received an engraved brick,

Jane graduated from Hershey High School and went to college at Penn State. While at Hershey, Jane was involved in all the musicals and had the lead in *Oklahoma!* when she was a senior. She also competed in the county, regional, state and All Eastern State choruses.

As an actress, her credits include Broadway's *A Christmas Carol*, Lincoln Center's live broadcast of *Camelot*, Off Broadway's *The Kid*, and National Tours of *The Sound of Music*, and *The Light in the Piazza*. Tell us a little about yourself... (town you live, family, pets, place you work, etc.)

I live in Hershey with two little kittens named Amelia and Simon and I work for the Commonwealth. I grew up on Long Island, New York and then moved while in my teens to St. Petersburg, Florida where I graduated from high school. Shortly thereafter my family moved to Hummelstown and I fell in love with central Pennsylvania. The only thing missing is proximity to the beach! A few years after graduating from Penn State I moved to Baltimore where I lived for 13 years. It was there that I developed friendships with a group of people in the film, video and television industry and found their discussions about the creative and production processes and the projects they worked on so very intriguing. It was a completely different world for me. The extent of my involvement was minimal though - I free-lanced on a couple commercials being filmed in Baltimore, providing craft services. I found the whole process fascinating - albeit working with a slightly diva-like director for whom I had to pick all the brown M&Ms out of the candy dishes because he didn't like them! But I digress...

What made you decide to volunteer for

Hershey Area Playhouse?

I decided to explore getting involved with Hershey Area Playhouse after a friend forwarded an email soliciting volunteers. When I saw that many of the positions required no previous theater experience – like ushering, box office, props crew, and back stage crew for example – I decided to give it a try.

When did you start working with Hershey Area Playhouse?

I began working with Hershey Area Playhouse in the fall of 2009 with Wait Until Dark.

What positions have you volunteered for so far?

I've ushered, worked concessions, been on the props crew, and have been house manager for the last four productions in a row. I'm taking a bigger step in terms of involvement by recently agreeing to produce the first play of the 2011 season, *The Importance of Being Earnest*, an Oscar Wilde comedy. I see producing as an avenue for me to put my experience in event planning and project management to use. I'm really excited about this opportunity and appreciate the vote of confidence!

What positions would you like to volunteer for in the future? I'd like to get on the rotation and produce again.

What do you like most about volunteering at Hershey Area Playhouse?

MENC: The National Association for Music Education, The American Alliance for Theatre and Education and the website for Americans for the Arts all cite research that shows a correlation between the arts and things like reading comprehension, school attendance and social skills. Most notably, The College Entrance Examination Board has reported that students involved in dramatic performance score an average of 65.5 points higher on the verbal component of the SAT and 35.5 points higher in the Math component.

So not only is acting fun- but as suspected, it better prepares you for life and career and creates young leaders! What's not to love?

It's never been easier to register for classes. The new streamlined classes are designed to fit busy schedules and more closely match the way kids like to learn. Again this winter we offer classes that are longer in duration but run for a shorter time period-giving the same number of hours of instruction in an easier to access format. This class teaches acting through creative dramatics and storytelling, exposing the children to their own creative and artistic possibilities – building communication, confidence and self-expression in a non-threatening atmosphere. She has been the Acting Class intern, aiding with the elementary and middle school groups, while taking the high school classes herself. In fact, she has been taking acting classes at the Playhouse for about eight years- half of her life!

Sarah has been homeschooled since first grade by her Mom, whom she credits as also helping her with her lines and costumes. 1. How did you get interested in theatre?

I always loved entertaining my family and friends and I wanted to share my talents with other people through the theater.

2. What other 'skills' do you have and that you have maybe taken classes on to help you? Over the summer Cory Wilkerson (who's am amazing teacher!) held a Shakespeare/Stage combat camp. I loved working with a sword and learning how to NOT hit someone!

3. What shows have you participated in?

Honoring the Gifts, and Classy with Hershey Area Playhouse Academy Players. I also worked backstage for Wait Until Dark and Hello Dolly!

4. What's your favorite thing about doing theatre?

In theatre you can be anyone or anything you want. You get to see things from a different point of view, and sometimes you might find similarities to yourself in characters that you would least expect.

5. What do you find the hardest/most challenging thing about theatre? It's challenging for me to create believable, unique, and relatable characters. It's not enough to just act like someone, you have to have an inner monologue running all the time of what the character is thinking, feeling or wanting.

6. What has been your favorite role/character so far?

In the Shakespeare/ Stage combat camp I was asked to play Mercutio in a scene from *Romeo and Juliet*. I wasn't really sure about the role at first because I'm used to doing comedy. I wasn't sure I could play a serious role well. However, I found similarities between Mercutio and myself and really got into portraying the character. I also got to try out some of my new skills with a sword.

7. What other areas of theatre are you interested in trying or doing? In one of my drama classes, Cory introduced us to Commedia dell'arte which is an Italian form of popular comedy developed during the 16th and 17th centuries. I'd like to do more because I found the physical antics of the Zanni challenging to learn and highly entertaining to perform.

8. Do you have a dream role or show you would like to do, what is it? I'd like to be any character in a performance of *Sweeny Todd*, which is my favorite musical. The dark themes are a nice change from the light and happy themes of other musicals.

9. If you were going to encourage other kids to do theatre, what would you say?

Theater is a fantastic learning experience for everyone, and you'll meet people who treat you like family no matter how different you are.
